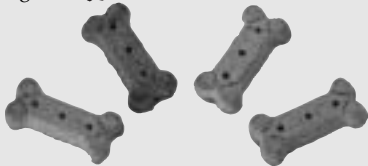

Over the past few years, I have lost several loved ones to death. These have included close friends, beloved family members and special pets. Many emotions are involved and with pets, often times, decisions have to be made to end their sufferings. These decisions never come easily even when we know, deep in our heart, it's the right thing to do.

After the loss of a loved one, each person's grieving process may vary and yet we may share similar emotional tides. Whether we have multiple pets or one, they become an important part of our families. Each of us develop daily routines such as feeding times, walking our pets, lap sitting during a favorite TV program or special playtimes. When pets become ill or elderly, new responsibilities develop in their care. They may need daily medications, a special diet, help getting in and out of the house, doing stairs or just getting up in your lap or into bed.



When their time comes and they pass from this world, we find ourselves reaching for their dish at feeding times or their leash or thinking we need to get home to give them their medicine. Their absence leaves emptiness, a silence and sadness that, at times, can be overwhelming. This is part of the grieving process and is normal for those of us who love our pets. They were part of our families and not just a dog, or cat, or horse or turtle and we miss them. It's okay to cry, to talk about them and to be sad.

My little elderly dog, Granny, is eighteen years old and becoming feeble. I rescued her when she was twelve years of age after she was thrown from a car. Needless to say, she was quite a mess. Even at the age of twelve, she was full of energy and very spry with a wonderful personality. She became my little princess, my dear little companion and the love of my life. She had me totally trained within a short period of time. Now, she is hard of hearing, almost blind, a finicky eater and having difficulty navigating the stairs and she needs assistance into her chair. I know that her time to leave me is approaching and I can't bear it. But, as great as the pain will be when she passes on, the joy of having her has been tenfold. That joy leaves you with an abundance of precious memories and the feeling of being blessed to have had that dear creature as part of your life. As with my previous pets that have passed, their memories are with me and give me comfort.



In the future, a new pet will most likely come into my life. I love to foster the old dogs that have been forgotten. My path will cross with an elderly dog that has been misplaced and will need a good home to live out the rest of its life. He or she will be older but for the both of us, it will be a new beginning of a loving relationship and a time to develop lasting memories to the end. I do this because the joy of having them in my life outweighs the pain of losing them. I wouldn't miss it for the world. 🐾

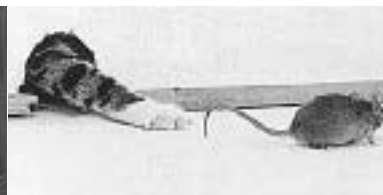
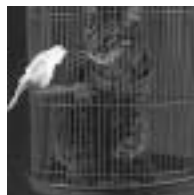

HABITAT FOR HOUNDS

In our communities there are many dogs sitting outside in the cold weather without shelter. Unfortunately, there are still many dogs who sit outside all the time, often chained, with a tree as their only shelter. Habitat for Hounds has been formed with the primary goal of distributing doghouses to animals in needy situations. We invite you to make a tax-deductible donation or donate a doghouse in good condition to Habitat for Hounds, in affiliation with Shamrock Foundation.

Since it began in the spring of 2003, Habitat for Hounds has collected 85 doghouses and delivered 60 of them to needy animals. When our volunteers deliver these outside homes, this is often a perfect time to talk with pet owners about the importance of pet care, spaying or neutering their animals, and encouraging them to bring their pets inside to be a healthy and active part of the family.

Habitat for Hounds, along with Shamrock Foundation encourages pet owners to keep pets inside and realizes that living in a doghouse twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week is not the best situation for a dog. Dogs are pack animals and form strong attachments to people, relying on us for food, water, shelter and affection. We also remind pet owners that dogs kept apart from their family members are more likely to become unhappy, anxious and aggressive. Lastly, a chained unaltered dog is most likely to bite, as its frustration of being trapped in a lonely environment continues to grow.

If you know of a dog who desperately needs a doghouse, if you would like to donate a doghouse or if you would like to make a contribution to help a dog who lives without shelter, please call us as 585-3220 and leave your message for the Habitat for Hounds program. Make your check to Habitat for Hounds, P.O. BOX 20086, LOUISVILLE, KY 40250-0086. Please, don't leave us out in the cold. 🐾

A kennel should be at least two times the length of the dog you are building it for. Measure your dog from the tip of his nose to the stretched out end of his tail! 🐾

ADOPTION THROUGH SHAMROCK

We receive many inquiries about how someone goes about adopting a pet through the Shamrock Foundation. Here are a few simple pointers that should help answer some of your questions.

SELECTING A PET 🐾 We recommend that you first notify us via phone, email (adoptions@shamrockpets.com) or both, that you are interested in seeing a particular pet. We will arrange to make the dog available for a visit. Please understand that we do not have our own building or offices. We always recommend that you come to our Adoption Days to see the pet and to speak with our volunteers. We will ask that you fill out an adoption application so that we may begin checking your references (it can take anywhere from a few hours to a week for us to process an application). If you'd like to fill out an application ahead of time they are available by contacting us at adoptions@shamrockpets.com.

ADOPTABLE DOGS

All of our dogs and puppies have been tested for heartworm, have their required vaccinations and have been wormed and spayed or neutered. Our list of adoptable dogs changes on a weekly basis so please visit **Dog Adoption Days** or our website www.shamrockpets.com to see the many wonderful dogs and puppies that need homes. Please consider adopting an older dog or open your heart and home to a Special Needs dog.

Buddy *5 years old; German Shepherd mix.*

He weights 65 pounds and has been neutered. Buddy does well with other dogs and is being kenneled by one of our volunteers because we do not have a foster home for him. He would be great for a single person looking for a companion dog. If you are interested in fostering Buddy please call 585-3320 or email us at adoptions@shamrockpets.com.

Lady *2.5 years old; American Eskimo.*

She is fine with larger dogs but would do better in a home as an only dog. She is good with cats and does fine with older children. She is cautious of strangers and is intelligent, alert and conservative, which are all characteristics typical of this breed. She weights 28 pounds.

Jewell *>1 year old; Dachsbund/Lab mix.*

She is 35 pounds. She came to us from rural Georgia as part of a litter rescue. She does well with other dogs and children. She is almost a year old, has been spayed and is current on all of her shots. Please contact us if you are interested in seeing her.

Jake *30 lbs.; Cocker Spaniel.*

He is a chocolate colored Cocker Spaniel. His family can no longer keep him because he does not do well with their children. However, he does well with adults and other dogs. He is house-trained and crate-trained. He weights 30 pounds and is neutered. He is a beautiful dog that needs to find the right home.

We often feature a cat and dog available from **Metro Animal Services**. Please consider them when you want to adopt a pet. *You'll be saving a life.*



TRIAL VISIT 🐾 Once you've found a pet that you are interested in and your application is approved we will allow you to take the pet home on a trial basis. We recommend that you start the trial visit on a weekend so that you can maximize the amount of time you are home. If, after a period of time, everything works out we usually proceed with the contract. The adoption fee is \$95.00 and that covers the spay/neuter, worming and shots. 95% of the adoption fee goes towards the dog. Unlike other rescue groups, we have very little operating costs since we are made up of volunteers.

If, for some reason, the adoption doesn't work out we ask that you return the dog or cat to us. 🐾

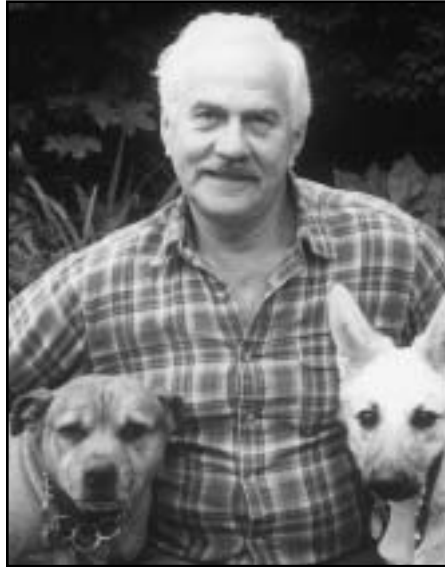

PETS GRIEVE FOR THEIR HUMANS TOO.

After my dad passed away his two dogs, Sheila and Paux, were confused. Even though I made sure that they saw his body leave the house, they still didn't understand that he wasn't coming back. Their daily routine was upset for several days and their leader and best friend was gone. Needless to say, they went through their own grieving process.

I could tell that they were constantly waiting for him to come home. They would race to the door every time I came home or we had a visitor. You could always see that they were disappointed when it wasn't my dad. Sheila was either on the lookout, wandering through the house like she was lost or sleeping on his bed or in her chair with one of his shirts. Paux did much of the same. For the first few days I had to hand feed them wet dog food so that they would eat. It was a sad time for them.

It was hard on me too, because there was no real way to communicate to them what had happened. I could see in their eyes and their actions their sadness. But, we all stayed busy. We did a lot together. We took walks in the park, fed the birds and raccoons, did laundry, cleaned, worked in the yard, attended Shamrock meetings, had friends over and slept together.

A dog that is truly your companion grieves just like a human friend. They have memories of the day-to-day schedule of activities and displays of affection. It's important that people realize that and allow them time to grieve and help them through it.

Be sure if you have a pet that loses their human companion that you keep an eye on their eating habits. Give them something special to encourage them to eat. Spend extra time with them and allow them to be near you throughout the day and night. Break up the routine for a while so that they have some unexpected distractions and fun. Daily exercise is extremely important. Exercise can improve their mood (and yours too). Dogs that have separation anxiety issues will probably grieve deeper. In some cases seeking medical attention for severe depression may be necessary. That is something that should be discussed with a veterinarian.

It's not any easy process because we can't talk about our grief, but we are there for each other, probably more than most. I don't know what I would have done without them and I feel sure that they feel the same way. That means a lot. 🐾

It was touch and go at times but Lover Boy made it, thanks to good medical care, devoted foster parents and much tender loving care.

Lover Boy is a true lap cat who loves to be held and petted. He loves to sleep with his person and preferably under the covers! He is front declawed and needs a home where someone is home most of the time, will keep him safe and shower him with lots of love for the rest of his life. CALLING 585-3220

Please,

- Listen carefully to the message and follow the instructions.
- Understand that rarely will a person answer the phone, volunteers pick up the messages and return calls.
- When leaving a message, speak clearly and be sure to leave your numbers.
- Be patient, our volunteers try to return calls as quickly as possible and in order of importance.

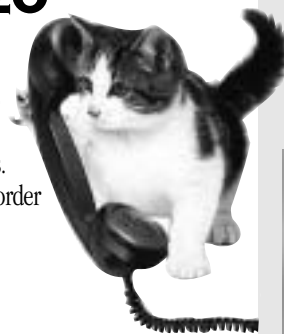
To insure a return phone call be sure to:

- Leave your number or numbers.
- Leave a brief message regarding your situation.

If you haven't received a return call within 48 hours, please call back because a volunteer may have tried to return your call.

- Make sure the numbers you leave are correct.
- Perhaps a family member or someone in the household has taken a message and has not relayed it to you.
- Please know that your caller ID will not show Shamrock Foundation's number; therefore, you may have received a return call and not realized it.
- If you don't have an answering machine or voice mail, it is difficult for a volunteer to leave a message. Volunteers will try to return a particular call up to 3 or 4 times and have to move on to other calls.
